# Twent-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time Gospel Reading Luke 18:1-8

Jesus urges his disciples to pray and not lose heart, for God hears and answers prayers.

# **Background on the Gospel Reading**

This is the first of two parables that Jesus tells in Luke 18 about prayer. (The second will be read at Mass next Sunday.) This first parable is a lesson in persistence in prayer. (Next Sunday's parable will address attitude in prayer.) While the parable seems to present prayer as nagging God for what we want, such a reading misses the point. God is not like the judge in the parable, worn down by requests and coerced to respond. The key is found in the description of the judge as corrupt and unjust. Since God can be neither, we must understand Jesus to be saying that if even an unjust judge responds to the persistence of the widow, how much more so will God listen to our prayers. God truly wants to hear our needs and respond generously. It is the final lament of Jesus that gets to the point of the parable. The lesson is about the persistence of the one who prays. God wants us to be like the persistent widow, staying in relationship with God, confident that God hears and answers prayers. Then Jesus laments, "Will such faith be found when the Son of Man comes?" In this lament, Jesus notes how easy it can be for us to lose heart.

# October the Month of the Rosary

Catholics have been praying the rosary for more than 800 years. Church tradition holds that the beautiful meditation was given to St. Dominic by Our Lady circa 1212 to combat heresy. Throughout the centuries, popes, saints, clergy, and Our Lady have emphasized the spiritual gifts and power of the rosary.

In 1571, Pope St. Pius V established the feast, then-known as Our Lady of Victory, to celebrate the Battle of Lepanto, a decisive naval conquest that saw the Holy League's fleet destroy the Ottoman Empire's navy. Lepanto marked the last major engagement in the Western world to be fought almost entirely between rowing vessels. Pope St. Pius V attributed the Holy League's victory to the Virgin Mary's intercession, facilitated by the pope's call for Europeans to pray the rosary. The power of praying the rosary, in his summation, tracked with St. Dominic's reception of the rosary from the Blessed Virgin a few hundred years prior.

Two years later in 1573, Pope Pius V's successor, Pope Gregory XIII, changed the name to the Feast of the Holy Rosary.

Mary has communicated the need to pray the rosary for world peace and the salvation of souls during numerous apparitions,

meditation on Christ's life, Catholics can grow closer to God while walking alongside His mother.

The prayers of the rosary are accompanied by meditations on the lives of Jesus and Mary called mysteries. These mysteries include the Joyful Mysteries, Sorrowful Mysteries, and Glorious Mysteries. In 2002, St. John Paul II instituted the Luminous Mysteries, offering the faithful a way to

"When we pray the rosary, we turn our minds, hearts, and even our bodies over to the influence and direction of God and the Blessed Mother," said Father John Sims Baker, pastor of Holy Rosary Church in Donelson. "We find peace and calm. We are prompted to be forgiving or to be more generous. We realize how much we are loved. We reflect on the great mysteries of salvation. The rosary makes us gentler and more appreciative of the goodness of others. I urge you with all my heart to begin or renew the practice of praying the rosary in the home. Families who pray together open themselves more to God's grace and blessings. "It takes a decision and commitment to follow through on praying a family rosary, but it is not burdensome," he added. "It becomes a cherished tradition that links us to God, to the Blessed Virgin, and to one another. What a memory to carry with you when things are tough or you are alone. The rosary is a loving cord that binds us as one."
